For Everyone Discussion Questions 1/12/20

Reminder:

As we continue to work through the gospel of Luke, we are challenging you to set four spiritual goals in the month of January for 2020.

Week 1 - What Will I Fill My Mind With? Pick one *Bible-Based* thing to add.
Week 2 - What Will I Cut Out Of My Life? Pick one unhelpful thing to remove.
Week 3 - Who Will I Spend My Time With? Pick one Christian person or group to join.
Week 4 - Who Will I Reach Out To? Pick one person to reach out to.

Getting Started:

1) Do you tend to keep what you should throw away, or throw away what you should keep? Explain.

2) We described our 2nd challenge on Sunday as *Taking Out The Trash: Identifying and removing one sinful or unhelpful thing from your life to follow Jesus better.* What are examples of things that aren't sinful but also aren't helpful to our relationship with God?

Digging Deeper: (Read Luke 3:1-18)

3) In verse 3 John is preaching a "baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins." Is Luke saying that John's baptism forgives people of sins? Explain.

4) Take each facet of the following definition of true repentance and discuss what false repentance might be.

True repentance is a lifelong sorrow for sin for *what it is* and not just *what it does*. A sorrow, in which a person takes personal ownership of sin, acknowledges God's righteous anger against it, renounces all religious attempts to excuse or fix it. A sorrow that compels a person to rely solely on Jesus' work to save them from it and on the Holy Spirit's power to impart a love for God that hates it as a rival in their hearts. And therefore they will live a life hating & fighting sin's power & presence in their life as long as it's around.

5) In verse 8, John prepares people by demanding, "*Bear fruits in keeping with repentance.*" What does that mean and how does this prepare them and us?

6) In verses 8-9, John prepares people by warning them not to say "*We have Abraham as our father*..." What is his point? How does this prepare them and us?

7) Read verses 15-17. John the baptizer and Jesus the baptizer are different. In what ways are they different? Read Galatians 3:19-27, Rom. 3:20; 7:7-14; 8:3-4 for help.

Putting It Into Practice:

8) Commit the 2nd challenge to prayer.
